This years Easter Candle has some beautiful symbols As part of its decoration.

The Gold Background symbolises the Kingship of Christ.

The Blue Cross symbolises Mary our Mother at the foot of the Cross.

The Heart in the Centre of the Cross - represents the ardent love of Christ.

The flames from the Heart are the flames of divine love.

The crown of thorns remind us of Christ's passion and wounds.

The Rays of Red and white light from the heart remind us of the blood

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Easter is the time of joy for us, the followers of Christ. So on behalf of our Parish Team: Priests, Deacons, staff and family we wish you all a JOYFUL Easter. From the earliest time, this has been the reaction of Christians to the news that Jesus Christ is risen. It means that God has conquered sin and death in raising his Son Jesus from the dead. This is a mystery that means so much to us as followers of Christ. It is a mystery that our Catechumens, both Adults and children are baptised into on Easter Saturday and Easter Sunday.

We listen to the Easter gospel stories of women arriving at the tomb and finding the stone rolled away and the tomb empty. Even more remarkable than that, they encountered Jesus alive. They spoke with him and touched him. They ate and drank with him. It truly was him and they were shown his wounds. Jesus passed the identity test.

The amazing thing about this mystery is that whatever happened to the body of Jesus we can be assured will also happen to us. Jesus encountered sin and death. He was wounded for our sake and in his wounded body He was raised to new life. Jesus is now in touch with wounded humanity. He is the Lamb once slain, who still bears the sign of his slaughter and yet he is alive.

Easter assures us that whatever wounds we have from life; the effects of sin or of hurt or of violence, they can be overcome. We may still carry the scars, but like Jesus we know it has not been in vain. It can be a source of new life if we allow the power of the Resurrection, the power of love to be the final word on it all.

May the power of the Resurrection enlighten and enliven your home and may you feel a real deep down joy. Alleluia Christ is risen indeed.

Icon Reflection

"Christ is Risen," is the Gospel proclamation. All four Gospels are silent on the manner of Christ's Resurrection. Nowhere in Scripture is there a factual account of the event, but rather it expresses what occurred before or after the Resurrection. Two Icons depict this mystery of the Resurrection, the Descent into Hades and the Myrrh-Bearing Women. The more familiar one is the Icon of the Descent into Hades. In it, Christ is seen trampling the gates of Hades, taking Adam and Eve by the hands and drawing them to life.

Our Lord's entrance into Hades, (depths of the earth) transforms it. Through death He entered the realm of Hades which in the Icon is shown by the black abyss. Christ's presence in Hades showed that He took upon Himself every humiliation and sin of mankind. He is shown as a conqueror with a radiant halo, the symbol of glory. His garments are brilliant, filling the darkness with the light of His divine presence. He stands upon the broken gate of the kingdom of death, thus indicating His victory over death by His own death and resurrection. Through His humiliation and death, He raised all creation to participate in Divine Life. Bolts, broken chains, and keys are scattered about to signify the freeing of those held captive and the breaking of death's hold over men. By Christ's descent, Hades is destroyed and its gates trampled. Having broken the bonds of death's power, Christ is seen raising Adam and Eve from the grave. In freeing our first parents, Christ also frees those who put their faith in His coming.

"The Resurrection is an earthquake for the Faithful, a cause of dread for the ignorant; for the Faithful because the sluggish body bestirs itself from the sleep of death, for the ignorant because, disturbed by the trembling of the body and the movement of the earth, they depart from faith and belief in the Resurrection."
